Task Outline:

 under the 1951 Convention on the Status of Refugees, you will research the viewpoint of a potential Q&A
 panellist on a show about asylum seekers.
- Using the scaffold provided, you will compose and present a script comprising of these main sections:
 - o Introduction: Your panellist's name, role and the sources you have used to research their point of view
 - o PART 1 PANEL (maximum of 3-minute contribution per person)
 - A. Your panellist's response to host Tony Jones' question:
 - "To what extent are Australia's current policies concerning asylum seekers ethical?"
 - B. Scripted rebuttal to how another panellist would be likely to challenge your panellist's point of view
 - C. Your panellist's response to a question from the audience (also scripted)
 - PART 2 PERSONAL REFLECTION (maximum of 2 minutes, recorded on your own)
 - A. Your personal response to Tony Jones' question above
 - B. Identify which of the above panellists aligns most closely with your personal point of view
 - C. Evaluate how much power that panellist wields in Australia's asylum seeker debate.
